Rider Education & Motorist Awareness

I have a great book on riding a motorcycle that I believe everyone should read. It is written by David L. Hough and the title of it is *Proficient Motorcycling – The Ultimate Guide to Riding Well*. It covers topics such as Risk, Motorcycle Dynamics, Urban Traffic Survival, Booby Traps, Special Situations and sharing the Ride. It is so well written and easy to understand and is a book that Pat and I both have read from cover to cover and still refer to once in a while.

One of the great sections in the book, Motorcycle Dynamics, explains in simple terms just how and why a motorcycle moves the way it does. It covers the basics in detail and explains just what keeps it balanced, what makes it turn and why and how it corners. It is full of details that will definitely make the "light turn on" if you want to truly understand the machine you ride. One of the things Pat and I were talking about (and this year it seems like we are talking about riding a lot more than we have actually been able to ride) is why in a turn we are actually turning when the wheel seems to be pointed straight ahead. (She never asks the easy questions.) Well, the answer to this question is in the book. The process is called "coning" – and no, we are not talking about heading to the DQ for an ice cream cone. When the tire is upright and we are traveling in a straight path our contact patch between the tire tread and the road is more or less flat and continuous around the tire. As we lean into a turn, the contact patch continues around the tire but becomes shaped more like a cone.

To understand the idea of coning it is suggested that we think of the shape of a Styrofoam coffee cup lying on its side. If you push the cup forward it will roll in a circle due to the fact that the circumference of the circle at the bottom of the cup is smaller than the distance around the open end of the cup. Our motorcycle tires act much the same way when we are leaned over – we are turning but it looks like we should be going straight. There really is a science to why motorcycles behave the way they do and the more you understand about the process, the better rider you will be.

Stag riders - have you completed a your "honey do" lists yet? You know you don't want a thing like that to keep you from going on this year's stag ride. Be sure to block out October 7th-9th on your calendar so you can go with us on this year's ride. We will

be following a route similar to last year. There will be a sign-up sheet at the September

Orange County Choppers Ride Report

On a steamy, sleepy Saturday morning, this past August 20th, twenty enthusiastic tourists and one apprehensive leader headed out West on eleven motorcycles toward legendary Orange County Indiana. It was already warm and moist, and we all knew that before long it would be hot and wet. Although this ride was to be only 350 miles round trip, it required a year to discover, plan, revise, pre-ride, pre-eat, pre-p, and etc. I knew there would be a variety of riders and bikes with varying range capabilities, and so the stops were planned so strategically that nobody would be caught short in any way.

Many motels, gas stations/restrooms, roads and restaurants had to be examined and meticulously scrutinized, leaving only a perfect plan. This was destined to be a truly sublime experience for everyone, who will inevitably look back afterwards astonished beyond words. No one knew this yet as I chose not to mention it, but just let it happen.

The first evidence of greatness in this ride surfaced at the first stop, one hour down the road. A light sprinkling of comments about nice roads began to land on my ego, and I smiled thinking, "you just wait!" The next stop was for lunch at the Heartbeat Café in Seymour, In., which totally delighted most of them. Some got cameras out and took pictures of the fifties-theme diner, and especially the monster hamburger Carl and Cris Hauser had ordered. It was called the Hubba-bubba and was

the size of a XXL cowboy hat! Again, more praises and smiling.

Inside, the hotel seems like mostly empty space. We stood in a domed atrium 200 feet in diameter and six stories high. Around the perimeter are 24 floor-to-ceiling columns topped with gold leaf clusters supporting the dome. Behind and between the columns are the six floors of guestrooms, all with an unobstructed view of the atrium and the opposing rooms. The floor is tiled with millions of tiny squares arranged in geometric patterns. A huge fireplace built into one wall is faced with randomly shaped painted tiles fit together into a forest scene, and created at the old Rookwood Pottery in Cincinnati. We were told that 33 million dollars had been spent on the restoration so far. The tour was concluded at the gift shop, but I waited outside on the big porch.

The rain had stopped, the sky was clearing and it was much cooler. The pavement was already nearly dry, being hot enough to vaporize the water from being baked in the 95-degree heat earlier. The 50-mile ride to the motel in Bedford, the evening dinner at the Amish buffet and the poolside party, were also wonderful. The ride home included beautiful back roads, a stop at the big

covered bridge near Medora, a lunch stop at Cabana Joe's in Madison, and finally the ice-cream stop at the UDF in Aurora. At first I thought I had the perfect plan, but I was wrong. Unforeseen events occurred which made the ride even better than my plan. Everyone said they loved it and we had a really fun group. I was so delirious when we got home that I sprung for Pay-per-view wrestling for our daughter that evening.
